ACPBA NB SOUTH REPRESENTATIVE ANNUAL REPORT 2021-2022

October 25, 2022

Another year has come and gone. Covid related restrictions have relaxed and all but disappeared in many respects. Luckily, for many Bands, that meant a return to almost normal. I reached out to the NB-South Bands for some comments as to what they have been up to this past year.

Ray Wallace, from the Moncton District Band, explained that it was a slow start to the season and were able to start full practices in the Spring. Their only playing commitment was for a Canada Day parade. Ray noted they were able to recruit some new members as the summer went on. As Covid restrictions lessened, they started received more and more requests for Pipers and full Band engagements. Ray was happy to report that August and September turned out to be pretty busy for the Band. The Band is looking forward to participating in November 11th ceremonies after a year or two of not having any services of remembrance. Ray finished with stating they were heading into the off season with a healthy number of members. They have plans to add to their tune repertoire but unfortunately will be using this as a year to rebuild and will unlikely be competing in the 2023 season.

Craig Wight forwarded a note summarizing what the RCMP Pipes and Drums – J Division (Moncton) have been up to. The Band does not compete. They are somewhat of a "garrison" Band. They showcase their talents at community events. Craig reported the Band stayed reasonably active through the pandemic with regular Zoom meetings. They were able to keep in touch with each other and learn new material. Craig happily reported they added members and now total 18, plus Dancers from the Dunnett School of Dancing from Riverview. They were busy with joint practices and events with the Halifax RCMP Band and performing in at least 5 communities in New Brunswick. Craig added that the Dancers added to their performance and participated in a number of their engagements. Craig included with his note a picture of the band showing their new uniforms and Dancers.



Finally, Dave Galbraith, from the Simonds Lions Caledonian, sent information regarding their activities. Unfortunately, due to practice venue pandemic restrictions, the band has only just recently been able to restart practices at an alternate location. The Band has also suffered loss of players for various reasons, including myself for health reasons. The Caledonian did perform at a limited number of engagements, but with a fraction of the normal complement of players. The goal this next season is to rebuild the Drum and Mid sections, add to the bands tune list, and recruit, recruit, recruit.

In closing, the NB South Bands have indeed survived the pandemic and have all initiated plans to rebuild. They were all able to maintain a level of contact that I'm sure meant a lot to each and every member. We are not just members of a band, we are part of a family. As noted earlier, I have had to retire my bass drum sticks and step back from the band Executive. I'm still around but only as a "Band Rat" with some timing skills. I will also not be re-offering as NB South Representative. However, I have it on good authority, a member of one of the NB South bands will be stepping forward. I thank you all for this opportunity and God bless.
